Emergencies

Glen Cove is basically limited to one entry/exit point along the Glen Cove Parkway. Many Glen Cove residents are concerned about emergency services reaching them in the event of a crisis. A house fire last fall on a street located just off the parkway created a roadblock. Responding emergency vehicles congested and blocked the Parkway leaving residents of the 500 plus homes west of South Regatta Drive unable to leave or return home for nearly two hours. Many traumas require air transport to John Muir Hospital in Walnut Creek or Children's Hospital in Oakland. For residents in southeast Vallejo, the GVRD soccer field next to Glen Cove Elementary School is a perfect place for trauma flights to land during day-light hours. As the gate is locked during night hours, but emergency access is still possible.

A Message from the Board President, Miguel Castillo

LITTER – You may have noticed lately that litter was accumulating at key locations throughout Glen Cove during February and early March. We've contacted the supervisor for the Glen Cove Landscape Management District (LMD) who informed us that litter accumulation resulted when the current LMD contract ended without a new contract in place and also because of a lack of funds to cover some services.

You may recall that several years ago there was a ballot measure to increase Glen Cove's LMD fees which was not approved by the voters. The fees have not increased in over 25 years and the current contractor cut some services, including litter removal, during the winter months in an effort to ensure the availability of funds to continue basic services. Litter was not removed from Glen Cove LMD areas for about a month. Unfortunately, no one thought to advise the Glen Cove board about the problem.

As of this writing, we still don't have a new contract but as a result of the money saved over the winter months, the contractor is again able to schedule litter removal twice a week as a routine part of their service. The board will continue to monitor the contract status and hopefully the issue will be resolved soon. Many thanks to those of you who routinely pick up litter during walks around the neighborhoods.

GRAFFITI - is an ongoing problem that appears from time to time throughout Glen Cove. Graffiti is a problem that needs to be addressed quickly because graffiti always seems to invite more graffiti. There's a graffiti hotline number listed in the Glen Cove newsletter that you can call whenever you spot graffiti. Unfortunately, the volunteer city wide graffiti abatement team only meets once a month so graffiti removal is not always addressed in a timely manner. Many of our board members and some residents have become graffiti vigilantes and while we don't encourage this, residents who have taken up the task of removing graffiti have managed to keep Glen Cove mostly graffiti free.

Please be advised that graffiti should never be removed from private property without the consent of the property owner, and graffiti that appears on unpainted wood fences should always be removed with a power-washer. Power washers can be dangerous to operate and requires an experienced operator. Also, G.V.R.D. targets graffiti removal from park areas.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH – we printed several newsletter articles late last year and earlier this year about neighborhood watch programs and hope that you and your neighbors have become better organized. Residents are often not motivated to organize a crime watch program group until after they've been burglarized.

We know that crime and safety issues are high on everybody's agenda so we've invited Mr. Tony Pearsall, Executive Director, Fighting Back Partnership, to be a guest speaker at our next community meeting on April 28th. Mr. Pearsall is a former Police Captain and currently heads an organization that among other things, helps coordinate efforts to organize citizens in neighborhood crime watch prevention programs.

A Message from the Board President *continued*

GLEN COVE ASSESSMENT FUND – the City of Vallejo is the entity with fiduciary authority and responsibility for the Glen Cove Tax assessment funds. The Glen Cove Board is working with the city in an effort to ensure that monies are used to fund projects that most Glen Cove residents favor.

The number one concern in Glen Cove is security. In view of the reduction in Vallejo’s police services, residents are feeling more anxious about their safety. There are guidelines that restrict how assessment fund monies can be used. Funds are limited to capital improvement projects that have a life span of twenty-five years or more. Indications are that some flexibility may be possible although it has been clearly communicated to us that assessment funds cannot be used to pay for services.

The Glen Cove Board created a subcommittee to work with the city to clarify the guidelines under which the funds are administered and to ensure that our recommendations are considered before a decision is made to fund a project. We expect to have more information to share at our April 28th community meeting.

Café at the Marina

Café at The Glen Cove Marina will have a “soft opening” the first or second week in April and a grand opening April 15th. The proprietor, Jason Rooke, is still finalizing details but expects to serve beer, wine and select “soju” cocktails while serving breakfast, lunch and dinner with brunch on the weekends. Breakfast and lunch will be more casual and most likely involve counter service, and during the evenings will have a wait staff and linen service. They’ll accept credit cards and do take-out. There will be pet friendly outdoor seating and happy hours. The interior will feature art work for sale from local artists, as well as live musical entertainment on select weekends. The menu will change seasonally and there will be weekly specials. The menu will be eclectic and offer many grilled options. Lunch will be in the \$5-9 range, appetizers in the \$6-9 range, entrees in the \$14-25 range.

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Grab Bag - Questions & Answers



What are the C.C.& R.'s and Vallejo Municipal Code (V.M.C.) guidelines regarding garbage and recycling bins left outside within sight of the street?

Answer: Except for the evening before pickup day and the actual day of pickup, your trash, yard waste and recycling containers are not allowed to be visible from the street (V.M.C. 7.54.030M) All garbage and recycling bins should be stored out-of-sight either behind a fence or in your garage if you prefer. While most Glen Cove residents comply with this ordinance, some do not and are subject to a notice and/or citation from the city. Please help keep our neighborhoods attractive by properly removing your containers.

I received a notice from the Glen Cove Community Association advising me that I'm not allowed to park my car on the front lawn or even on the unpaved portion of my drive way. Why?

Answer: Per V.M.C. 7.54.030J your vehicle should not be parked on your front yard or on an unsurfaced side yard....ever! We have lots of new residents and some may be unaware of this restriction. Since the restriction is also a V.M.C., residents risk being cited for this violation by the city. This includes boats and RV's. Your front and side yard is supposed to be landscaped and should not be used to park and store vehicles. Incorrectly parked vehicles detract from the neighborhood's appearance and can over time further depreciate the value of Glen Cove properties.

Why are home improvement projects subject to architectural reviews? I recently added a sun-room to my home and don't understand why my neighbors were asked for their approval.

Answer: The guidelines that cover architectural review originate from V.M.C.'s, C.C.& R.'s, and sometimes from the California Municipal Code and often from all three. The guidelines are meant to ensure that residents do not undertake a project that would adversely affect the integrity of their home or of the neighborhood. The guidelines and codes are also meant to ensure compliance with safety codes and inspections. Most of the reviews are routine and in most cases, home improvement projects enhance both the property and the neighborhood. The City of Vallejo will not issue a project permit without the Glen Cove Community Association Board's approval.

Why are there different sets of Codes, Covenants, and Restrictions (C.C. & R.'s) in Glen Cove? Can they be consolidated?

Glen Cove was not developed as one single development. We currently have 22 developments within Glen Cove, most with their own set of C.C.& R.'s. While most of the C.C.&R.'s conform to a core of common requirements, some of the requirements differ from one development to another. This has made enforcement difficult in some cases. The board is currently working to create a new website for Glen Cove and will post all of the existing C.C.&R.'s for resident's review. An effort may be undertaken at some future point to consolidate the C.C.& R.'s. Consolidation may require a ballot measure which would be costly. We will keep the community informed of efforts to move forward on this issue.

We will have two important guest speakers at our April 28th, Glen Cove Community Meeting.

Our first speaker will be Linda Seifert, Solano County Board of Supervisors, District 2. Supervisor Seifert is the newest of the County Supervisors, having been elected in 2008 and beginning her term in January 2009. Prior to running for county office, Supervisor Seifert spent almost twenty years practicing law, first as the first woman partner at the firm of McNamara Law Firm in Walnut Creek and then as General Counsel for the California Dental Association. Throughout her career, Supervisor Seifert has served the community in numerous capacities including as a member and Vice President of the Solano County Library Foundation, member of the Child Haven Board of Directors, member and President of the Green Valley Landowners Association Board of Directors, and member of the Advocates for the Arts Board of Directors. While at McNamara Law Firm, she served as President of the Contra Costa County Women's Bar Association and as a member of the board of directors of the Contra Costa Bar Association. In addition to her multiple board, commission, and committee assignments as a Supervisor, she is a member of the National Association of Counties (NAC), the California State Association of Counties (CSAC), the California Women Lead, the Benicia League of Women Voters, the Benicia Historical Society, the Vallejo Chamber of Commerce, and the Sierra Club. Supervisor Seifert lives in Green Valley with her husband.

Our second speaker will be Mr. Anthony Pearsall. Mr. Pearsall is the Executive Director and founding member of Fighting Back Partnership, a non-profit collaboration of businesses, residents and government since 1990. Mr. Pearsall directs and manages 22 grants with a 2 million dollar budget. He is a past member of the Robert Wood Johnson Drug Advisory Board and founder of our Neighborhood Revitalization Program with the Vallejo Police Department. While a member of the police department, he conducted over 200 decoy programs. Mr. Pearsall has over 20 years of fundraising experience having raised over \$250,000.00 from local businesses and residents and has over 25 years of proven success in managing law enforcement programs and criminal justice training. Mr. Pearsall holds a Master of Science in Criminal Justice and four Peace Officers Standards and Training executive management certifications. Mr. Pearsall has also previously served as a Vallejo City Council Member and Vice Mayor, and as a Captain with the Vallejo Police Department.

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You can compost what? by Jane Bogner

Since we are all itching to get out and plant that vegetable garden, but know it's too early, we should concentrate on loading our compost piles to cook enough black gold for planting.

Wine is a zero-waste drink; put the bottle in the recycling bin and the cork in the compost. Leftover wine that you are not cooking with can even help the composting process. If you make your own beer or wine, all of the waste is a beneficial addition to the pile.

Bread, as well as other stale starches such as crackers or pretzels, along with cooked **pasta** and **rice** can all be composted. These drier items will help offset the wetter kitchen waste.

Herbs, spices, and jams all have a limited shelf life. Once they are too old to use, they can be added to the pile as well. The Kosher kitchen staff at Touro University recently cleaned off a couple of shelves of old spices. The stale fennel seed made a fragrant path in my garden and the rest was layered in my compost piles.

Egg shells are compostable, however I prefer to crush and spread them around the yard. This discourages snails and slugs and magically it disappears into the earth.

Leftover dairy products like melted ice cream, yogurt, and moldy cheese can also be composted, but put it in sparingly.

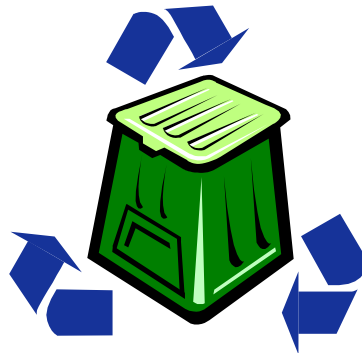
Napkins, paper towels and some food packaging can go into the bin. Most boxes should go into your recycling toter, but the occasional food box will add some dry carbon to your pile. Do not add paper that has oil on it. Now into the bathroom. Used **cotton balls** and cotton swabs (with paper stems) can be composted. **Lint** from the dryer and even old shredded cotton or wool clothing can go in your bin.

Your **hair** and your pet's fur are very valuable. It is full of useful nitrogen as are your nail trimmings.

Dust from your **vacuum bag** breaks down well as does the wood ashes from your fireplace but add both sparingly.

Keep in mind smaller pieces make fast compost.
