

Know Your Vallejo Admirals

The sights, sounds, smells and tastes of professional baseball at Wilson Park are hallmarks of Vallejo's summer months. As spring blooms, and as the national pastime returns to our local diamonds, the Vallejo Admirals are preparing to defend their Pacific Association championship. In the spirit of "All Community, All Fun," the Admirals are lining up another extensive schedule of promotions and special events, tailored to appeal to baseball newcomers and diehards alike.



Festivities officially begin on Opening Night, Thursday, May 31, when the Admirals hoist their championship pennant at Wilson Park, and host the season's first contest against the Pittsburg Diamonds. This season, weeknight tilts begin at 6:35 p.m., with Saturday first pitches scheduled for 5:05 p.m., and classic Sunday afternoon baseball starting at 1:05 p.m. In the season's early days, the Admirals invite their guests to enjoy a Championship Pin Giveaway, Little League Night, and College Night.

The club proudly brings back its signature "League of Chefs" Gourmet Wednesdays, with innovative ballpark fare that simply can't be found anywhere else in the league. Some of last year's delectables included a dungeness crab sandwich, lamb merguez sausage, a

"PLT" sandwich (pork belly, arugula and heirloom tomato sandwich), and tuna poke.

Also, the best entertainment value in town grows in value: Admirals 2018 season ticket packages will remain at 2017 prices, and season ticket package members receive an extra five Buddy Passes, good for use throughout the season. Season ticket holders may take advantage of several other new perks, such as an exclusive concessions line, a guarantee to receive all ballpark giveaways, and invitations to special team events. Grandstand season ticket holders will also receive reserved seating privileges through the end of the first inning at each game.

Having helmed the Admirals to a 2017 league crown, P.J. Phillips, the incumbent Pacific Association Manager of the Year, is back to guide the ballclub in its attempt to repeat. "I am happy to be back," Phillips said, "and excited to get to work to win another championship."



Letter from the President

I think in many ways we have done this. I feel safer having done the crime reports for 2 years now and working with the Vallejo Police Department to establish a neighborhood watch. Because of my interactions with the GCCA, I have had the pleasure of getting to know more residents while helping them resolve issues. Earlier in the year I received a message from the wonderful woman who we see picking up trash along glen cove parkway. She had noticed a number of issues in glen cove that required attention. We decided to have me come along for one of her walks to see what she sees. What an eyeopener. There were issues ranging from general trash to broken water infrastructure. We contacted the appropriate departments and all immediate fixes have been taken care of where as some of the longer issues are being kept on top of. What really amazed me (besides that fact that she walks most of glen cove parkway regularly) was how little I see because I just drive home. While it was concerning to be picking up a few alcohol bottles, what was heart warming was the community. I couldn't even guess how many people honked and scream "thank you" from their cars. It was an amazing experience and I thank her so much.

Last quarter I mentioned that the GCCA has been attempting to work with traffic regarding the number of issues we have such as speeding, running stop signs, and spinning doughnuts. This is a common problem in Vallejo with understaffing. We have encountered it in multiple departments. If you have followed much of the fire department lately you will know what I mean. We are continuing



to try to find solutions and will keep you updated.

Our April community meeting is only a couple of weeks away (Thursday, April 19th). We have confirmed the Vallejo Water Department to come speak as well as the new city manager, Greg Nyhoff. I have received numerous questions about the recent water increase and the state of our water infrastructure. The Vallejo water department approached us, asking if they could reach out through our meeting to address any issues we might have. We welcome and appreciate this effort. The city manager is new and this will be an opportunity to meet him and understand his plans for Vallejo as well as Glen Cove. The Admirals' charge to last year's championship starred Tillman Pugh, the league's Most Valuable Player. Pugh batted .322 with 18 home runs and 58 runs batted in, and he also swiped 30 bases. The Admirals' pitching staff, which finished the season strong, featured top starter Demetrius Banks, who went 7-3 and struck out 86 opposing batters, and league Reliever of the Year Sammy Gervacio, who saved 18 games. P.J. Phillips, his staff, and the Admirals front office have redoubled their efforts to recruit another formidable roster for the 2018 campaign.

The Pacific Association has expanded to six franchises, with new entrants in the Martinez Clippers and Napa Silverados. 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I Heard It

I have one zinfandel grape vine growing in my yard and know very little about its proper care and, until very recently, virtually nothing about pruning it. In order to correct this situation, I attended a Home Vineyards-Spring workshop put on by the Master Gardeners of Napa County. Most of the attendees at this class owned land in Napa Valley proper or the Carneros Region and wanted to be successful wine grape growers. I was hobnobbing!

My goal in attending this workshop was to learn the correct way to prune my vine. The presenters spoke about two systems for training grape vines: head trained and cordon pruning. In the former, the plant is held up by a vertical stake and is pruned so that five or so spurs grow off the main trunk vertically and diagonally. Depending on the age of the vine, the spurs will be one or more feet long after pruning.

In cordon pruning the main trunk grows vertically along a stake until it reaches the height at which the grower wants horizontal growth. A trellis is created using two parallel, horizontal wires. The vine is trained to send out horizontal branches (cordons/permanent arms) in two directions along the lower wire. The arms are trained so that spurs grow vertically from them. When these spurs are pruned, they are shortened so that 2 to 3 buds are left. From these buds vertical shoots grow up-

ward and are supported by the second horizontal wire a couple feet above the lower wire. The bunches of grapes grow off these shoots. Approximately eight leaves are needed in order to support/create the nutrients for one cluster of grapes.

After the vines have bloomed and at the beginning of berry set, leaves in the fruiting zone should be removed in order to expose the grapes to sunlight. Care should be taken to avoid removing too many leaves on the south or western sides in order to avoid sunburn on the grapes. Also, a dense canopy may lead to bunch rot or mildew since air movement helps reduce moisture on the grapes.

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Having learned the above information, it will be difficult for me to train my mature vine into the cordon configuration I wish to have. However, over the next few years I will gradually prune in order to get closer to the desired form.

The workshop covered many more aspects of growing vines including: frost protection, nutrition and fertilization, irrigation, pest control, and vineyard floor management/cover crops. There isn't room to get into them here, but the interested reader may consult the "California Master Gardener Handbook" published by the University of California, Agricultural and Natural Resources. The handbook can be checked out of the Solano County Library System or purchased online.

The annual **Vallejo Garden Tour**, a fundraiser for the Vallejo Naval and Historical Museum, will take place on Sunday, May 20. Tickets are \$40 for museum non-members and three tickets may be had for the price of two if purchased prior to May 1. They may be bought at the Museum, Ferry Building, and Zoey June on Tennessee Street.

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CalMaritime Rugby Program Rises to a New Level

California State University Maritime Academy's Athletics Department has established the Rugby Inspired Scholarship Endowment (RISE), which will be used to fund the John Machado Scholarship and Rugby program.

RISE will help cover costs for travel, equipment, training, fees, and any other practice or game-related expenses. The endowment was made possible by generous support of the rugby alumni and supporters of the team, for which head coach <u>Steve Hiatt</u> is extremely grateful.

"Cal Maritime Rugby has played an instrumental part in developing young cadets into mature, responsible and effective graduates who work well in teams and successfully handle pressure", said Coach Hiatt. "We're grateful for the tremendous support shown by our alumni and supporters in building this fund. RISE gives us a powerful tool to continue our mission."

The Cal Maritime Academy Rugby Program was started in 1998,

gained varsity status in 2001, and has been one of the school's most successful sports. The Keelhaulers have won the Pacific Coast League's Western Division Championship in eight of the last nine years, made two Final Four appearances (2012 & 2015), and finished with a top-five ranking in four of the past six seasons in the National Small College Rugby Organization, which includes over 240 men's college rugby teams.

Cal Maritime is part of the Cal State University System. Although it is much smaller than its CSU brethren, it has consistently been rated highly by US News & World Report for its low tuition and high earnings for its graduates.

The Scholarship will be awarded annually to incoming freshmen or current students, and the amount of the scholarship will be based on the endowment performance and scholarship needs. Scholarship distribution and recipients will be recommended by the Director of Athletics and Rugby coaching staff. Recipients must be a prospective or current member of the Rugby team, and in good academic standing.





LMD Update

Current maintenance in-

cludes fertilization, v-ditch cleanout through the rainy season, and systems checks and start-up for irrigation. Clearing of fire breaks is ongoing and will be maintained through the dry season. They are getting towards the end of hard pruning for winter time and entering maintenance





of everything pruned. Fiscal year-end rehab projects are

gearing up to close out the year.

Litter removal of Glen Cove Parkway is scheduled for every Monday and Friday. They are starting the bollard work for safety purposes on Glen Cove Parkway at New Bedford Dr and Saybrook Way within the next few weeks.

The Glen Cove Community Association has **South Regatta Drive Fence Update** been in communication with Ryen Goering,

California State Parks Sector Superintendent, for over two and one-half years regarding the poor condition of the fence along South Regatta Drive. Since the last Newsletter article about the fence, State Parks staff members have surveyed the fence in order to determine on whose land it is located. They found that the fence lies on State Park's land or on the boundary with City of Vallejo land. Thus, the fence is under State Parks jurisdiction and is their responsibility.

Mr. Goering stated that State Parks policy is to replace the existing fence with split rail. This decision concerned many of us who view the existing fence with its wire mesh as a significant barrier to wild animals entering the neighborhood and domestic animals going onto the parkland. State Parks naturalists don't share our concerns. The two-rail split rail fence in Benicia State Recreation Area is low and easily scaled. We have requested and Mr. Goering has agreed to a three-rail split rail fence (like the fence at Glen Cove Waterfront Park) that is taller and provides more of a barrier. Unlike the fence at the Waterfront Park, State Parks policy is not to set the posts in concrete.

Where we are at the moment is that Mr. Goering has proposed that we share the cost of materials for the fence. He noted that the City of Vallejo might help with removal of the old fence. He proposes that the new fence be constructed using volunteer labor. Since the fence is over one-half mile long, it is a huge project and, undoubtedly, would take a very long time to complete using sporadic,



volunteer work parties. There is hope that additional resources can be obtained as an alternative to using volunteer labor solely.

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Meet Bobby Dean Taylor....again!

Bob recently had a hernia operation at the Vallejo Kaiser Hospital. From the very beginning starting with the admission process he was recognized and greeted by all of the staff.

So who is Bob? Bob along with his wife Linda are the people behind the "Christmas Lights House" on top of Glen Cove Road.

We featured Bob as a "Person of Interest" three years ago but wanted to do something special for this printed version of the newsletter. Since he is so universally known and liked we did a follow-up interview with him to find out what's new since we last interviewed him.

Bob was born in Visalia but moved to Vallejo when he was 4 years old. In 1961 he started his electrical apprenticeship with the IBEW local 180 (International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers) and is now retired after 44 years of service. Little did he know that it was this electrical training that was going to be very helpful to him later on in life.

Bob had three daughters, Debbie, Donna, and Denise. Debbie was the oldest. Debbie had never flown in an airplane before and needed to take a trip to Little Rock AR but was very nervous about flying. Her younger sister who is a flight attendant convinced her to take the trip. This flight took place on June 1, 1999 and in the middle of a terrible storm the pilot missed the runway and crashed the plane. There were 11 fatalities including Debbie. Christmas was her favorite time of the year so her younger sister suggested that they decorate for Debbie and started with a manger on the front yard. For the last 18 years the number of displays and lights has exploded to what you see now and continues to grow every year. Bob Taylor remarried 11 years ago and his wife Linda is just as passionate about decorating for Debbie as is the rest of the family.

New to the display are Star Wars characters. Also, Bob has been slowly getting rid of incandescent lights and now the lights are 100% LED's. Bob says that before LED's they were pretty much maxed out on power despite upgrades. Prior to LED's when the lights were on in the front yard they couldn't use the indoor appliances. One evening Linda turned on the microwave and created a black out in the front yard". LED's have also helped cut down on the PG&E bill.

Bob no longer uses aluminum foil around the trees. The foil was harming the trees causing them to rot from the inside out. The Taylors have been giving away some of their older displays to make room for the new ones. Expect more blow up displays for this Christmas.

The recent addition of a poured concrete walkway provides for wheel chairs or walker access. The new walk way was courtesy of <u>Bayshore Building Materials and James Kale</u> Concrete Works for which Bob is very grateful.

The merry- go-round that broke last year has been repaired. There will be a short preview of the lights on Halloween. XMAS hours are Monday-Thursday dusk to 10PM, and Friday-Saturday until 11 PM. Closer to Christmas the lights are on until midnight.

Bob asks if some of our readers would like to help put up lights. The Taylors have an enormous task ahead of them and could use all the help they can get. They usually start decorating in October. They ask for volunteers to help put up lights by holding work parties on the weekends. The Taylors provide food and drinks for their helpers. Anybody who has a couple hours of free time during the week is welcome to stop by.



Solano Rowing Club Calls Glen Cove Marina Home




Whaleboat racing as a team sport has been a part of the San Francisco Bay area waterfront life since the early 1800s. Whaleboat racing competition took its current form in the Bay Area in 1965 under the sponsorship of maritime companies using U.S. Coast Guard boats built in the 1930s and 40s. By 1982, the Bay Area Whaleboat Rowing Association (BAWRA) was formed to provide standards for safety and competition and membership grew to include private teams. In the early 1980s, new whaleboats were being built for the specific purpose of racing.

The first race of the 2018 spring season is April 14, right here in Vallejo, starting at 9:30 am. The

race can be viewed from the seawall next to the Ferry building. Rowing as exercise encompasses full-body strength training, endurance training, interval training and aerobic training all while maintaining rhythm and timing with your teammates. It is the most fun you will have while working out! SRC is committed to promoting health, athleticism, teamwork and also conducts charitable activities that support the community.
