


## **Community Meeting & Monument Vote**

On Thursday, April 18, 2019, the Glen Cove Community Association (GCCA) spring community meeting was called to order, at the Glen Cove Elementary School assembly room.

The main order of business was the landscape maintenance on a portion of Glen Cove Parkway, presented by the City of Vallejo's Landscape Maintenance District representatives. The topic included a review of what, where and potentially when landscaping improvement would occur. Included in the presentation were options to upgrade the existing Glen Cove Monument, located on Glen Cove Parkway, near Robles Drive. The options were presented, voted on and decided by the meetings attendees after very spirited participation and discussions. The monument, that was selected by a show of hands vote, is pictured below. Additional information will be provided once plans are confirmed.





Also present was a representative (Kirk Williamson) of the Vallejo Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), who presented disaster preparedness information, for your home, family and neighbors, including gas and water shutoff, as well as securing the water heater,

having a ("GO") readiness bag to grab in case of emergency evacuation and having non-perishable consumable food and water available. Sign-up sheets were available for interested Glen Cove residents, who would like to get involved in the CERT program. The GCCA wishes to express their gratitude for all those who attended and participated in the Community Meeting.

The next GCCA Community Meeting will be (on) October 03, 2019. The new Vallejo Fire Chief Daryl Arbuthnott is a confirmed speaker. We hope to see many Glen Cove residents in attendance. The GCCA Board is actively seeking volunteers for upcoming events, newsletter contributions, etc. Volunteer sign-up sheets will be available at the October 3,2019, community meeting.

First and foremost, thank you to the resident for reaching out and taking action over concerns in our

area. This appeared to have happened around the same time as a tent was reported on Nextdoor and SeeClickFix. People mobilized, called, reported, and I am happy to say the issue was resolved. Of all of the homeless encampment reports that I have seen, this one was quickly resolved (5 days according to SeeClickFix). The city and county are stretched thin, but the squeakiest wheel gets the grease. If you see something, report it

and if it is already reported, confirm/like/repeat so that officials know the severity of an issue.



### Glen Cove Park now has Pickleball courts

Pickleball is a paddleball sport that combines elements of tennis, badminton, and table tennis. Two or four players use solid paddles made of wood or composite materials to hit a perforated polymer ball, similar to a Wiffle Ball, over a net. The sport shares features of other racquet sports, the dimensions and layout of a badminton court, and a net and rules somewhat similar to tennis, with several modifications.

## South Regatta Drive Fence Project Update

The first phase of the South Regatta Drive fence project is complete. With the old fence gone, there is a different feel along the street. The view is opened up and the community is more connected to the open space.

For the past six months on the last Friday of each month, a team of volunteers has been hard at work taking down the old fence. This group of volunteers usually works at Mt. Diablo State Park

and they come from a variety of cities in the Bay Area. Residents should be very grateful for their efforts. All of the old fencing, posts, boards, and concrete have been removed. The accompanying photo shows California State Parks worker Daniel Carmichael on a tractor dragging away an old fence post and concrete.

The next phase will be the construction of over one-half mile of three-rail split-rail fence. Several sections of the new fence have already been installed at the upper end of the street. According to Mr. Carmichael, California State Parks staff will take the lead on construction. The intent is



to meet one day every other week, perhaps on Wednesdays, to do the work. Volunteers are welcome to assist. All residents need to do to help is show up, sign a waver, and get to work. Bring your own gloves and appropriate clothing. We look forward to the completion of this project that has been nearly four years in the making.



### Person of Interest: Mark Porter

If you have worked in multiple business categories during your life, you probably can appreciate Mark Porter's career trajectory better than most of us.

## **London Plane Trees**

There are many London plane trees growing along Glen Cove Parkway in the Landscape Maintenance District (LMD) areas. They can be identified by their distinctive flaking, brown, gray and cream colored bark and their alternate, palmately lobed leaves. At the last Glen Cove community meeting we were told that more of these trees would be planted when the vegetation along the parkway is renewed during the coming years.

London plane trees (Platanus x acerifolia) are thought to be a hybrid of American sycamore (P. occidentalis) and oriental plane (P. orientalis) trees. They are valued as a tree that does well along streets because they are tolerant of bad air and compacted soil. They were planted in large numbers in Victorian times because of their resistance to the polluted London air.

In the Summer 2019 Nature Conservancy magazine there is an article about city plantings (Urban Roots) in which London plane trees are named as one of the most common trees in New York City. They are said to withstand pollution and space constraints and may live up to 200 years. The article quotes New Yorker magazine as calling it "the New Yorkiest of Trees".

Many of the London plane trees in Glen Cove do not look well. They have experienced premature leaf



drop, twig death, and extremely slow growth over the years. They appear to have damage that can be attributed to anthracnose, a general term for a number of fungal diseases. The fungus that is most likely to have attacked the London plane trees is Apiog-

nomonia veneta. This plant pathogen together with the mild weather and moist conditions in Vallejo have led to many stressed trees across town. It is this latter factor, environmental conditions, that may account for the success of London plane trees in the Big Apple. Perhaps the freezing winter temperatures in New York are detrimental to the survival of this tree pathogen allowing the trees to thrive.

The landscape architect who is creating the plan for the new plant material along the parkway has proposed Platanus x acerifolia 'Columbia'. This variety is less susceptible to anthracnose than other Platanus species. However, after a joint meeting of Glen Cove Community Association LMD committee members and City of Vallejo staff, an agreement was reached to remove London plane trees from the plant restoration plan.



In the next newsletter there will be an article about the trees chosen to replace the London plane tree along the parkway.

## **Admirals Off to Another Exciting Start**


The Vallejo Admirals are off to another exciting start to the 2019 Pacific Association baseball season. The Admirals, coming off of back-to-back playoff berths including the 2017 Pacific Association championship, have been very competitive in the early going.

Carl Brice, Dakota Freese and Jesse Remington have led a solid pitching staff that has ranked second in the Pacific Association in ERA. The much-improved staff has been the biggest early-season surprise for Vallejo.

On offense, several familiar stars are back, mixed with new faces. Nick Akins Sr. has returned in the outfield, coming off of one of the most impressive seasons in Pacific Association history. Akins hit 29

home runs in 2018 and also drove in 81 runs. Both marks rank second all-time on the Pacific Association list.

Also, back is leadoff hitter/right fielder Vladimir Gomez, one of the most exciting players in the league. Gomez has been one of the team's top hitters in the first two weeks of the season, hitting over .300. The 2017 Pacific Association Most Valuable Player Tillman Pugh is back. Pugh, a local two-sport star at De La Salle High School-Concord, is a former New York Mets farmhand.



New faces include catcher Ricky Gingras, also hitting over .300 in the early season. Gingras spent four seasons with the rival San Rafael Pacifics before coming to Vallejo this year. Former Cal two-sport star Jacob Wark has taken over duties at first base. A big (6-foot-4, 220), powerful player, Wark is also an aggressive and speedy baserunner. He scored all the way from second base on a sacrifice fly in an early-season game.

The team is capably led by manager P.J. Phillips, a former Admirals player who pushes the right buttons to make the team go. The Admirals sat in third place at 7-5 two weeks into the Pacific Association season. Vallejo is likely competing with San Rafael and Sonoma down to the end of the season. The Admirals are hoping to reprise their 2017 championship, their first in Pacific Association



history. That year, the team rallied in the second half of the season and defeated the Sonoma Stompers for the title.

Vallejo plays its home games at Wilson Park in Vallejo (1007 Vallejo Avenue). Admirals home game combine the best of professional baseball with the home town feel of the minor leagues. Contests are held including the Sac's Tasty Hot Dogs Sack Race (a potato sack race for teams of children), trivia, baseball bingo and the Jack Anthony's Seven Flags Car Wash "Dirtiest Car in the Lot." Prizes can be won on a nightly basis.

Fans are right on top of the action at Wilson Park and interact with the ballplayers before and after the games. The Vallejo Admirals provide community entertainment at an affordable price. Continued from page 11
