It's all about Cement!

It is the policy of the Glen Cove Community Association not to be partisan in local politics because clearly, there are many points of view within our community and they must all be respected. However, not being partisan does not mean that we're not political. We are political when it comes to issues that affect our community or that have the potential to burden us with unreasonable cost or harm our environment and quality of life. Even events that occur outside of Glen Cove merit our attention if they have the potential to affect us.

The Vallejo Marine Terminal, LLC, and Orcem Cement propose to build a deep water port facility and ship products produced by a cement plant which would be located at the former site of the old General Mills flour mill. Old piers will be removed and replaced with a new deep water facility. Raw materials that would include ground glandular blast furnace slag would be delivered to the facility and the finished products would be shipped out on trucks over city streets and through existing neighborhoods.



The Environmental Impact Report (E.I.R.) notes that the project would result in significant and unavoidable impact to our air quality, cultural resources, greenhouse gas emissions, noise, traffic, and public safety. Project developers have not ruled out using the terminal to export coal.

After carefully reviewing the pros and cons on the project, the GCCA board has taken an official position against the project. We would like to urge Glen Cove residents to research the project by checking the city's website where you can review the E.I.R. A final E.I.R. was due out on April 7th with a final hearing tentatively scheduled for May 9th.

Letter from the President






and have served on the GCCA board for the past 3 years including 2 years as your vice president. In 2010 when my wife and I were searching for a home, we drove past the Glen Cove Parkway and asked our realtor why we hadn't looked in this area. Unfortunately, Vallejo, along with some other Bay Area cities, had a stigma which had reached my wife and me. We decided to look into Glen Cove and, as you all know, were pleasantly surprised. I still remember our second look and the day we placed an offer that three of our neighbors came out and greeted us. We swapped stores and information about the area. We were sold and moved in a month later.

My first interaction with the GCCA came 2 week after we moved in. I received a call about how my front yard lawn was dead. I informed the nice lady that I had lived here for 2 weeks and according to our C.C. & R.'s (guidelines and rules that govern Glen Cove) I had 90 days to remedy the situation. In a shocked voice she said "you actually read your C.C.& R.'s." She then asked if I would be interested in joining the GCCA. I declined at the time. Much of my background is in managing volunteer organizations and I understood then and even more now, how difficult it can be to get people to volunteer.

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Let's Fight Those Weeds


The winter rains have made the landscape beautifully green and, unfortunately, have brought on an invasion of weeds. A simple definition of weed is "a plant growing where it is not wanted." As such a rose bush growing in the middle of the lawn could be considered a weed.

Why are weeds undesirable? They compete with desired plants for space, water, nutrients, and sunlight. Many are invasive, that is, they get a foothold then take over the space and grow or multiply quickly. If that weren't enough, they may contain aller-

gens to which many people react and they may serve as hosts to insect pests and provide cover and nutrients for pests like rodents.

Weed control is a relatively simple concept: remove the weeds and keep them from returning, however, in practice, controlling them is challenging. The California Master Gardener Handbook suggests several methods of weed control.

Cultural methods of weed control attempt to make the environment less favorable for weeds. For example, a patch of

Mechanical or physical weed controls include pulling weeds by hand, cultivation (hoeing), rototilling, dicing, mowing, or chopping. After a rain when the ground is soft, many weeds can be pulled easily by hand. A "weed popper" is a small handheld tool with a forked end that can be inserted into the ground in order to pry up the weed, roots and all. Poppers are especially useful when attempting to get rid of plants with long taproots, for example, dandelions. Other weeds like petty spurge and catchweed bedstraw can be pulled without a popper and most of the roots will come out. Another tool is the "hula hoe" which is used to scrape off the weed stem at or below the soil line. This technique must be repeated a few times as the roots remain intact until they are starved due to a lack of nutrients. Another method is to use a flamer or blowtorch to burn the weeds out of existence. This method requires the burning of fuel, usually propane, so the environmental effects should be weighed against the benefits. The use of boiling water has received mixed reviews to kill weeds. There is also the issue of the amount of fuel necessary to heat the water viewed against the number of weeds actually destroyed.

After a four-hour talk on weeds I attended, the speaker stated that if the audience members remembered nothing from the lecture except for one thing, it would be to make sure that the weeds do not go to seed.

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For example, when you see the yellow flowers of the dandelion, pick them immediately and dispose of them. The dandelion flowers turn quickly into hundreds of little seedpods that are waiting for a puff of wind to disperse them.

Soil solarization involves placing clear plastic over soil that has been loosened, moistened, and finished to grade. The edges of the plastic should be weighted down or covered with soil for at least a month and a half during the warmest months of the year. Solarization controls many types of weeds but not all.


Biological controls employ natural weed enemies such as insects and disease to reduce the size of weed populations. This method, although possible to use, may be challenging for home gardeners.

Chemical weed controls include the use of organic and inorganic substances that kill plants. There are pre-emergent and post-emergent herbicides that either keep weed seeds from germinating or poison them after they have begun to grow. If you go to the garden sections of local stores you will find shelves filled with a variety of herbicides and pesticides. While they can be effective, they may kill off beneficial plants and animals as they eliminate the weeds or pests they target. Also, these chemicals get into the soil and when it rains may be washed into storm drains and ultimately into the bay. Think of the cumulative effect if gardeners in every yard in Vallejo use chemicals! The use of chemical controls should be your last resort.





Vallejo Admirals are Back!!

The Vallejo Admirals will be the host team of the **2016 Pacific Association Tryouts** on Saturday, April 23rd and Sunday, April 24th. The tryouts will be held at CC Sabathia Field at Vallejo High School.

All Pacific Association teams will be present, and potentially scouts from Major League Baseball teams.

Over 35 players have been selected to spring training rosters over the last two seasons from the league tryout, including the league's Rookie of the Year in 2015, and the ERA leader in 2014.

Players must be at least 21 years old to play in the Pacific Association. For the 2016 season, players must have been born on or before January 1, 1994 to be eligible. Sign up now and save \$50! The registration fee is \$125 in advance and \$175 at the gate on the day of the tryout. Check in will start at 8:00am with warm-ups starting at 9:00am. Tryouts will start promptly at 9:30am. This tryout is competitive, however don't let that keep you from pursuing your dream. All participants will be given the opportunity to show their potential on the field.

In the event that you are not invited to spring training, you will be given a detailed scouting report on your strengths and areas for improvement. Most baseball tryouts do not give you this valuable feedback, so this is well worth the price of the tryout.


