We live in such a beautiful area and it's easy to forget that when you see it every day. Take a moment in the next month to walk outside and watch the sunset or nature blooming. It's amazing.

Neighbors around Glen Cove have started outside projects to help make Glen Cove even better. If you are starting one of these projects, like painting or replacing your roof, don't forget to contact your representative to make sure it conforms to your CC&R's. In many cases it requires an Architectural Review, which is a simple process that can be done fairly quickly.



As I mentioned (and will continue to mention), the GCCA is in need

of more representatives from area's all around Glen Cove. I'm pleased to say we have added two new representatives. If you are at all interested, please call me at 925-285-5873 and I would be happy to discuss the position.

Finally, I want to chat a little about crime. If you follow Nextdoor.com you will notice that crime is mentioned quite a lot. We have issues with people speeding, break-in's, vehicle theft, and domestic disputes. As I watched the reports come across, I started to become more vigilant. I had my security company come in and do a review of my system and I began small changes to make myself safer (leaving lights on, checking locked doors, actually using my alarm, etc.) At this point, feeling paranoid and defensive of my home, I decided to actually crunch some numbers. In the month of May, the city of Vallejo had 529 reported crime, 13 of which were in Glen Cove. That put's Glen Cove accounting for about 2% of the city's crime. When I compared the numbers to Benicia, over the last few months we have had about equal if not less crime per person. Those numbers are a lot different than how it feels to just hear what social media is saying. That being said, we must remain vigilant so we can keep it as safe and make it even safer than it is now. I have created a crime prevention committee for the GCCA to help people make their neighborhoods safer. If you have idea's and would like to help, please contact me. Drought Update and Water Conservation

We experienced a four-year drought; El Nino promised us a wet 2015-16 winter; it rained quite a bit; and the snowpack in the Sierra was replenished. Despite near normal rainfall in Northern California, approximately 60 percent of the state is still in severe drought. So what is the current status of water restrictions in Vallejo?

In June, 2015 the Ćity of Vallejo announced restrictions on potable water usage which include watering only between 6 pm and 9 am, a maximum of three times per week (Monday, Wednesday, and Friday (MWF) even numbered addresses only, and Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday odd numbered addresses, and MWF for common areas) with the exceptions of drip irrigation, soaker hoses, and hand watering. The application of potable water to landscapes that creates runoff is generally prohibited, as is the application of potable water to driveways and sidewalks except when an immediate health or safety issue exists. Irrigation using potable water within 48 hours of measurable rainfall and use in fountains or decorative features are prohibited. Fines of up to \$500 may be levied for multiple infractions. In February of this year these restrictions were extended through October 31, 2016.

I contacted a staff member in the City of Vallejo Public Works Department to ask for confirmation of these restrictions. I was directed to a press release entitled "State Water Board Stresses Need To Continue Water Savings As Drought Persists," dated June 6, 2016. A new State Water Board regulation allows local water suppliers to determine their own standards based on a "stress test" that requires them to prove they have enough water to supply users through three years of severe drought or take additional measures to conserve. Thus, the City of Vallejo may change the restrictions given above in the coming months. If the city council votes to ease the restrictions, my advice is to adhere to the ones currently in place since they are generally quite reasonable.

In order to reduce water usage, it is advisable to have plants that require less water. California native plants are usually an excellent bet. The part of most yards that is not in the least drought tolerant is our lawns. Although most of us love green grass, lawns require a great deal of water in order to stay alive much less green.

There are alternatives to lawns and the Solano County Water Agency continues to provide an incentive to make the change. There is a program, Water-Efficient Landscaping Rebates (Turf Replacement Rebate Program), that offers \$1.00 per square foot (up to \$1,000) to replace a water-intensive lawn with water-efficient landscape. The latter may include rock, bark, pavers or other permeable surfaces along with drought resistant plants and drip irrigation.

order participate this popular program call 707-455-1113 to in or email solanocash4grass@scwa2.com to get on the waiting list and receive details. Once you are accepted you should arrange for a site visit during which the lawn area will be measured (do not remove your lawn prior to this inspection). After the agency representative has concluded that the proposed new landscaping is consistent with the reimbursement program, wait for the Notice to Proceed letter. You have three months to remove the lawn and install the new landscape once the notice is received. Upon completion, call for the post-inspection visit and submit the Rebate Application form that includes a list of plants and materials used in the conver-

sion, then wait for the check and enjoy paying smaller water bills.


